# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER, 2024.

#### 1. Description of business

BIOVACCINES NIGERIA LIMITED is a private company limited by shares domiciled in Nigeria. The Company's registered office is at 445 Habert Macaulay, Yaba Lagos. The company is strictly established to carry on the business of production, sales and distribution of human vaccines.

#### 2. Significant accounting policies

#### (a) Basis of preparation

The Financial Statements are prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) issued by the International Accounting Standards Board and the requirements of Companies and Allied Matters Act (CAMA) 2020. The Financial Statement is presented in the Nigerian Naira, rounded to the nearest thousand.

#### (b) Basis of measurement

The Financial Statement is prepared on the historical cost basis.

#### (c) Use of estimates and judgement

The preparation of Financial Statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the results of which form the basis of making the judgements about carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. Actual results may differ from these estimates under different assumptions and conditions.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised, if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods, if the revision affects both current and future periods.

Information about significant areas of estimation uncertainty and critical judgements in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the Financial Statements are described in notes to the accounts.

#### (d) Foreign currency translation

#### (i) Foreign currency transactions

The Naira is the company functional and reporting currency. Foreign currency transactions are translated at the foreign exchange rate ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated using the year-end rates; the resulting foreign exchange gain or loss is recognized in the income statement. Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currency at historical cost are translated using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction; no exchange differences therefore arise. Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currency at fair value are translated using the exchange rate ruling at the date that the fair value was determined. Foreign exchange differences arising on retranslation are recognized in the Income Statement.

Unrealized exchange differences on non-monetary financial assets (investments in equity instruments) are a component of the change in their entire fair value. For a non-monetary financial asset held for trading or designated at fair value through Income Statement, unrealized exchange differences are recognized in the income statement. For non-monetary financial investments available-for-sale, unrealized exchange differences are recorded directly in equity until the asset is sold or becomes impaired.

#### (ii) Foreign operations

The assets and liabilities of foreign operations, held in functional currencies other than the Naira are translated from their functional currency using the year-end rates. Income and expenses are translated at average rates for the period, provided the average approximates the rates ruling at the date of the transactions. Foreign exchange differences arising on translation are recognized initially in the statement of comprehensive income and only in the Income Statement in the period in which the foreign operation is eventually disposed.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER, 2024.

#### (e) Property, plant and equipment

#### (i) Recognition and measurement

Items of property and equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditures that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. When parts of an item of property or equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property and equipment.

#### (ii) Subsequent costs

The cost of replacing part of an item of property or equipment is recognised in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the Company and its cost can be measured reliably. The costs of the day-to-day servicing of property and equipment are recognised in Income Statement as incurred.

#### (iii) Depreciation

Depreciation is recognised in Income Statement on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of each part of an item of property and equipment. Depreciation begins when an asset is available for use and ceases at the earlier of the date that the asset is derecognised or classified as held for sale in accordance with IFRS 5 *Non-current Assets Held for Sale and Discontinued Operations*.

The estimated useful lives for the current and comparative period are as follows:

Motor vehicles/Trucks 3-8 Years
Office equipment 3-10 Years
Furniture and fittings 3-10 Years
Plant and Machinery 10-20 Years

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reassessed at each reporting date.

#### (iv) Revaluation

On revaluation of property, an increase in the net book value is credited to a revaluation surplus reserve. A decrease in the net book value is used to reduce the amount of any existing revaluation surplus on the same item before it is charged to the Income Statement.

#### (v) De-recognition

An item of property and equipment is derecognised on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on de-recognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in Income Statement in the year the asset is derecognised.

#### (f) Intangible assets

The company recognises an intangible asset, whether purchased or self created (at cost) if, and only if:

- · it is probable that the future economic benefits that are attributable to the asset will flow to the entity; and
- the cost of the asset can be measured reliably

This requirement applies whether an intangible asset is acquired externally or generated internally. The Company adopts the same recognition criteria for additional intangible assets.

The probability of future economic benefits must be based on reasonable and supportable assumptions about conditions that will exist over the life of the asset. The probability recognition criterion is considered to be satisfied for intangible assets that are acquired separately or in a business combination.

If an intangible item does not meet both the definition of and the criteria for recognition as an intangible asset, such expenditure should be recognised as an expense when it is incurred.

Software acquired by the company is stated at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses.

Amortisation is recognised in Income Statement on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of the software, from the date that it is available for use. The estimated useful life of software is the license period, for acquired software, and off-the-shelf software without license period, the useful life is 3 years. The useful life and residual value of all software are reassessed annually.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER, 2024.

#### (g) Financial instruments

#### (i) Financial assets

The Company's business model fall into three categories, which are indicative of the key strategies used to generate returns:

- Hold-to-collect (HTC): The objective of this business model is to hold loans and securities to collect contractual principal and interest cash flows. Sales are incidental to this objective and are expected to be insignificant or infrequent.
- Hold-to-collect-and-sell (HTC&S): Both collecting contractual cash flows and sales are integral to achieving the objective of this business model.
- Other fair value business model: These business models are neither HTC nor HTC&S, and primarily represent business models where assets are held-for-trading or managed on a fair value basis.

#### Classification of financial assets

Financial assets, which include both debt and equity securities are amortised at initial recognition at their fair value and are classified and subsequently measured at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL), fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI) or amortised costs. Subsequent classification and measurement for debt securities is based on our business model for managing the financial instruments and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the instruments.

#### (ii) Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss. Loans and borrowings, payables, or as derivatives designated as hedging instruments in an effective hedge, as appropriate.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value. In the case of loans, borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

The Company's financial liabilities are trade and other payables.

#### (iii) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash euivalents comprise cash and short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value. An investment with a maturity of three months or less is normally classified as being short-term. Cash and cash equivalents form part of the company's financial assets.

#### (iv) Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables are stated at fair value and subsequently measured at fair value through profit or loss, less provision for impairment. Impairment thereon are computed using the simplified IFRS 9 Expected Credit Loss (ECL) model, where the receivables are aged and probability of default applied on each aged bracket. Trade receivables meet the definition of financial assets and the carrying amount of the trade receivables approximates their fair value.

#### (v) Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables are stated at their original invoiced value. The Directors consider the carrying amount of other payables to approximate their fair value.

#### (h) Inventories

In accordance with IAS 2 (Inventories), inventories encompass assets held for sale in the ordinary course of business (finished goods and goods purchased for resale), in the process of production for such sale (work in process) or in the form of materials or supplies to be consumed in the production process or in the rendering of services (raw materials and supplies). Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. The net realizable value is the achievable sale proceeds under normal business conditions less estimated cost to complete and selling expenses. Costs of inventories are determined on a first-in-first-out basis.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER, 2024.

#### (i) Fair value measurement

The Company measures derivatives at fair value at each reporting date and for the purposes of impairment testing, uses fair value less costs of disposal to determine the recoverable amount of some of its non-financial assets.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

Ø In the principal market for the asset or liability, or

Ø In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Company.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in each circumstance and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximizing the use of relevant observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the Financial Statements are categorized within the fair value hierarchy; described as follows, based on the lowest-level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

Ø Level 1 — Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Ø Level 2 — Valuation techniques for which the lowest-level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable.

Ø Level 3 — Valuation techniques for which the lowest-level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable.

For assets and liabilities that are recognised in the Financial Statements on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by reassessing categorisation (based on the lowest-level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

The Company determines the policies and procedures for both recurring fair value measurements, such as derivatives, and non-recurring fair value measurements, such as impairment tests.

At each reporting date, the Company analyses the movements in the values of assets and liabilities which are required to be re-measured or reassessed as per the Company's accounting policies.

The Company also compares the changes in the fair value of each asset and liability with relevant external sources to determine whether the change is reasonable.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Company has determined classes of assets and liabilities based on the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above.

#### (j) Impairment of financial assets

All assets are reviewed whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amounts for those assets may not be recoverable. If assets are determined to be impaired, the carrying amounts of those assets are written down to their recoverable amount, which is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use, the latter being determined as the amount of estimated risk-adjusted discounted future cash flow. For this purpose, assets are companied into cash-generating units (CGUs) based on separately identifiable and largely independent cash flows.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER, 2024.

Impairments, except those related to goodwill, are reversed as applicable to the extent that the events or circumstances that triggered the original impairment have changed. Impairment charges and reversals are reported in the Income Statement.

#### (k) Impairment of non-financial assets

The Company assesses at each reporting date whether there is an indication that an asset (or CGU) may be impaired. Management has assessed its CGUs as being an individual field, which is the lowest level for which cash inflows are largely independent of those of other assets. If any indication exists, or when annual impairment testing for an asset is required, the Company estimates the assets or CGUs recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the higher of an assets or CGUs fair value less costs of disposal (FVLCD) and value in use (VIU). The recoverable amount is determined for an individual asset, unless the asset does not generate cash inflows that are largely independent of those from other assets or Companys of assets, in which case the asset is tested as part of a larger CGU to which it belongs. Where the carrying amount of an asset or CGU exceeds its recoverable amount, the asset/CGU is considered impaired and is written down to its recoverable amount.

In calculating VIU, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset/CGU. In determining FVLCD, recent market transactions (where available) are taken into account. If no such transactions can be identified, an appropriate valuation model is used. These calculations are corroborated by valuation multiples, quoted share prices for publicly traded companies or other available fair value indicators.

Impairment losses are recognised in the Income Statement and other comprehensive income in those expense categories consistent with the function of the impaired asset.

For assets/CGUs, an assessment is made at each reporting date to determine whether there is an indication that previously recognised impairment losses may no longer exist or may have decreased. If such indication exists, the Company estimates the assets or CGUs recoverable amount. A previously recognized impairment loss is reversed only if there has been a change in the assumptions used to determine the assets/CGUs recoverable amount since the last impairment loss was recognised. The reversal is limited so that the carrying amount of the asset/CGU does not exceed either its recoverable amount, or the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation/amortisation, had no impairment loss been recognized for the asset/CGU in prior years. Such a reversal is recognised in the Income Statement and other comprehensive income.

For Intangible Assets with Indefinite Useful Life and Intangible Assets not yet available for use, the assets are tested for impairment annually and when circumstances indicate that the carrying value may be impaired. Impairment is determined for them by assessing the recoverable amount of each CGU (or Company of CGUs) to which they relate. Where the recoverable amount of the CGU is less than its carrying amount including goodwill (in the case of a business combination), an impairment loss is recognised. Impairment losses relating to goodwill cannot be reversed in future periods.

In respect of other assets, impairment losses recognised in prior periods are assessed at each reporting date for any indications that the loss has decreased or no longer exists. An impairment loss is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount. An impairment loss is reversed only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation or amortisation, if no impairment loss had been recognised. Reversals of impairment losses are recognised in Income Statement.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER, 2024.

#### (I) Offsetting financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are set off and the net amount presented in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Company has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognized amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

#### (m) De-recognition of financial instruments

The Company derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows on the financial asset in a transaction in which substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred, or when it has assumed an obligation to pay those cash flows to one or more recipients, subject to certain criteria.

Any interest in transferred financial assets that is created or retained by the Company is recognized as a separate asset or liability.

The Company derecognises a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged, cancelled or expire.

#### (n) Finance cost and income

Finance cost and Income for all interest bearing financial instruments, except for those classified at fair value through Profit or Loss, are recognised within 'finance income' and 'finance cost' in the income statement using the effective interest method. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash payments and receipts through the expected life of the financial asset or liability (or, where appropriate, a shorter period) to the net carrying amount of the financial asset or liability. The effective interest rate is calculated on initial recognition of the financial asset and liability and is not revised subsequently.

The calculation of the effective interest rate includes all fees and points paid or received transaction costs, and discounts or premiums that are an integral part of the effective interest rate. Transaction costs are incremental costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition, issue or disposal of a financial asset or liability.

Finance cost and income on all trading assets and liabilities are considered to be incidental to the Company's trading operations and are presented together with all other changes in the fair value of trading assets and liabilities in net trading income.

Finance cost and income presented in the Income Statement include interest on financial assets and liabilities at amortised cost on an effective interest basis.

#### (o) Leased assets – lessee

Leases are classified as finance leases when the terms of the lease transfer substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership to the lessee. Upon initial recognition, the leased asset is measured at an amount equal to the lower of its fair value and the present value of the minimum lease payments and depreciated over the shorter of their useful economic life and the lease term. Subsequent to initial recognition, the asset is accounted for in accordance with the accounting policy applicable to that asset.

Other leases are operating leases and are not recognised on the Company's Statement of financial position.

#### (p) Lease payments made

Payments made under operating leases are recognised in Income Statement on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives received are recognised as an integral part of the total lease expense, over the term of the lease.

Minimum lease payments made under finance leases are apportioned between the finance expense and the reduction of the outstanding liability. The finance expense is allocated to each period during the lease term so as to produce a constant periodic rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Contingent lease payments are accounted for by revising the minimum lease payments over the remaining term of the lease when the lease adjustment is confirmed.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER, 2024.

#### (q) Revenue

Revenue is recognised to the extent it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, excluding discounts and value added tax. Revenue comprises income from sales of pharmaceuticals and other pharma related products.

Deferred income is income received in advance for which related services have not been rendered. Such turnover is usually deferred until the related service has been rendered. Deferred income is transferred to turnover over the relevant period, when the related services have been rendered.

#### (r) Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised in respect of goods and services received when supplied in accordance with contractual terms. Manufacturing costs between validation and the achievement of normal production are expensed as incurred. Advertising and promotion expenditure is charged to profit or loss as incurred. Shipment costs are charged to cost of sales; distribution costs on sales to customers are included in distribution expenditure.

#### (s) Income tax

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred tax. Income tax expense is recognised in the Income Statement except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case the tax is recognised in other comprehensive income or equity, respectively.

Current tax is the expected tax payable on taxable income for the year, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date, and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years.

Deferred tax is recognized, using the liability method, on temporary differences arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the Financial Statements.

Deferred tax is not recognised for the following temporary differences: the initial recognition of goodwill, the initial recognition of assets or liabilities in a transaction that is not a business combination and that affects neither accounting nor taxable profit, differences relating to investments in subsidiaries to the extent that they probably will not reverse in the foreseeable future and differences arising from investment property measured at fair value whose carrying amount will be recovered through use.

The amount of deferred tax provided is based on the expected manner of realisation or settlement of the carrying amount of assets and liabilities using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

A deferred tax asset is recognised only to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which the asset can be utilised. Deferred tax assets are reviewed at each reporting date and are reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that the related tax benefit will be realised.

Additional income taxes that arise from the distribution of dividends are recognised at the same time as the liability to pay the related dividend is recognised.

#### (t) Provisions, Contingent liabilities and Contingent assets

A provision is recognized if, it occurs as a result of a past event, the Company has no present legal or constructive obligation that can be estimated reliably, and it is not probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation. Provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows at a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and, where appropriate, the risks specific to the liability.

A provision for restructuring is recognized when the Company has approved a detailed and formal restructuring plan, and the restructuring either has commenced or has been announced publicly. Future operating costs are not provided for.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER, 2024.

A provision for onerous contracts is recognized when the expected benefits to be derived by the Company from a contract are lower than the unavoidable cost of meeting its obligations under the contract. The provision is measured at the present value of the lower of the expected cost of terminating the contract and the expected net cost of continuing with the contract. Before a provision is established, the Company recognizes any impairment loss on the assets associated with that contract.

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past event and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company, or the Company has a present obligation as a result of past events but is not recognised because it is not likely that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, or the amount cannot be reliably estimated.

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past event and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company. Contingent assets are never recognised, rather they are disclosed in the Financial Statements when they arise.

#### (u) Employee benefits

#### (i) Defined contribution plans

Obligations for contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in Income Statement when they are due.

#### (ii) Short-term benefits

Short-term employee benefit obligations are measured on an undiscounted basis and are expensed as the related service is provided.

A provision is recognised for the amount expected to be paid under short-term cash bonus or profit-sharing plans if the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

#### (v) Share capital and reserves

#### (i) Share issue costs

Incremental costs directly attributable to the issue of an equity instrument are deducted from the initial measurement of the equity instruments.

#### (ii) Dividend on ordinary shares

Dividends on the Company's ordinary shares are recognised in equity in the period in which they are paid or, if earlier, approved by the Company's shareholders.

#### (iii) Earnings per share

The Company presents basic earnings per share (EPS) data for its ordinary shares. Basic EPS is calculated by dividing the profit or loss attributable to ordinary shareholders of the Company by the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding during the period.

Diluted EPS is determined by adjusting the profit or loss attributable to ordinary shareholders and the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding for the effects of all dilutive potential ordinary shares.

#### (w) Segment reporting

A segment is a distinguishable component of the Company that is engaged either in providing products or services which are subject to risks and rewards that are different from those of other segments (business segment), or in providing products or services within a particular economic environment which are subject to risks and rewards that are different from those of other segments (geographical segment). The Company's primary format for segment reporting is based on business segments.

#### 3 New standards, Amendments and interpretations not yet adopted

Below are new standards in issue and relevant to the Company but not yet effective and have not been applied in preparing these financial statements. The Company does not plan to early adopt these standards. These will be adopted in the period that they become mandatory:

**IFRS 18: Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements -** IFRS 18, which was issued in April 2024 to replace IAS 1 (Presentation of Financial Statements), set out requirements for the presentation and disclosure of information in general purpose financial statements (financial statements) to help ensure they provide relevant information that faithfully represents an entity's assets, liabilities, equity, income and expenses.

The standard is effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027 and the Company is currently in the process of assessing the impact that the initial application would have on its business and will adopt the standard as applicable.

The Company plans to adopt the amendment on the required effective date, when required. However, based on available information, the Company expects no significant impact on its statement of financial position.

**IFRS 19: Subsidiaries without Public Accountability: Disclosures -** IFRS 19, which was issued in May 2024, specifies reduced disclosure requirements that an eligible entity is permitted to apply instead of the disclosure requirements in other IFRS Accounting Standards.

The standard is effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027 and the Company is currently in the process of assessing the impact that the initial application would have on its business and will adopt the standard as applicable.

The Company plans to adopt the amendment on the required effective date, when required. However, based on available information, the Company expects no significant impact on its statement of financial position.

Amendments to the Classification and Measurement of Financial Instruments (Amendments to IFRS 9 and IFRS 7)', which was issued in May 2024 to address matters identified during the post-implementation review of the classification and measurement requirements of IFRS 9 'Financial Instruments' - Matters as: how entities account for the derecognition of financial liabilities and how financial assets are classified.

The standard is effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2026 and the Company is currently in the process of assessing the impact that the initial application would have on its business and will adopt the standard as applicable.

The Company plans to adopt the amendment on the required effective date, when required. However, based on available information, the Company expects no significant impact on its statement of financial position.

**Lack of Exchangeability (Amendments to IAS 21)**, which was issued in August 2023, contains guidance to specify when a currency is exchangeable and how to determine the exchange rate when it is not.

The standard is effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2025 and the Company is currently in the process of assessing the impact that the initial application would have on its business and will adopt the standard as applicable.

The Company plans to adopt the amendment on the required effective date, when required. However, based on available information, the Company expects no significant impact on its statement of financial position.

#### 4. Measurement of fair values

Some of the Company's accounting policies and disclosures require the measurement of fair value, for both financial and non-financial assets and liabilities.

The Company has an established control framework with respect to the measurement of fair values. The Chief Financial Officer has overall responsibility for overseeing all significant fair value measurements, including Level 3 fair values, and reports directly to the Board of Directors.

The Chief Financial Officer regularly reviews significant unobservable inputs and valuation adjustments. If third party information, such as broker quotes or pricing services, is used to measure fair values, then the Chief Financial Officer assesses the evidence obtained from the third parties to support the conclusion that such valuations meet the requirements of IFRS, including the level in the fair value hierarchy in which such valuations should be classified. Significant valuation issues are reported to the Board of Directors.

When measuring the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Company uses observable data as far as possible. Fair values are categorised into different levels in a fair value heirarchy based on the inputs used in the valuation technique as follows;

- \* Level 1: quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- \* Level 2: input other than quoted prices included in level 1 that are observable for the assets or liability, either directly (i.e as prices) or indirectly (i.e, as derived from prices)
- \* Level 3: inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs)

If the input used to measure the fair value of an asset or a liability might be categorised in different levels of the fair value hierarchy, then the fair value measurement must be categorised in its entirety in the same level of the fair value hierarchy as the lowest level input that is significant to the entire measurement.

The Company recognises transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy at the end of the reporting period during which the change has occurred.

#### 26 Financial Risk Management

#### Financial risk factors

The Company is exposed to the following risks from its use of financial instruments:

- i Credit risk
- ii Liquidity risk
- iii Market risk

The Board of Directors has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the Company's risk management framework.

The Company's risk management policies are established to identify and analyse the risks faced by the Company, to set appropriate risk limits and controls, and monitor risks and adherence to limits. Risk management policies and systems are reviewed regularly to reflect changes in market conditions and in the Company's activities.

Financial assets of the Company include cash at bank and in hand, trade and other receivables. Financial liabilities of the Company include Bank overdrafts, short term loans, trade and other payables.

#### (i) Credit risk

Credit risk arises when a failure by counter parties to discharge their obligations could reduce the amount of future cash inflows from financial assets on hand at the reporting date. The Company has no significant concentration of credit risk. The Company has policies in place to ensure that services are rendered to clients with an appropriate credit history and monitors on a continuous basis the ageing profile of its receivables. Cash balances are held with high credit quality financial institutions and the Company has policies to limit the amount of credit exposure to any financial institution.

#### Trade and other receivables

The Company's exposure to credit risk is influenced mainly by the individual characteristics of each customer.

The Company recognises impairment that represents its estimate of incurred losses in respect of trade and other receivables. The main components of this amount are a specific loss component that relates to individually significant exposures and a collective loss component established for groups of similar assets in respect of losses that have been incurred but not yet identified.

#### (ii) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that arises when the maturity of assets and liabilities does not match. An unmatched position potentially enhances profitability, but can also increase the risk of losses. 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#### (iii) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that changes in market prices, such as foreign exchange rates, interest rates and equity prices will affect the Company's income or the value of its holdings of financial instruments.

#### **Currency Risk**

The Company is exposed to currency risk on sales, purchases and borrowings that are denominated in a currency other than the respective functional currencies, primarily the Naira (N).

In respect of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies, the Company's policy is to ensure that its net exposure is kept to an acceptable level by buying or selling foreign currencies at spot rates when necessary to address short-term imbalances.

#### Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that expenditure or the value of financial instruments will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. Borrowings issued at variable rates expose the Company to cash flow interest rate risk. Borrowings issued at fixed rates expose the Company to fair value interest rate risk. The Company's management monitors the interest rate fluctuations on a continuous basis and acts accordingly.

At the reporting date the Company does not have any interest-bearing financial instruments.

#### 27 Capital management

The Company manages its capital to ensure that it will be able to continue as a going concern while increasing the return to owners through the strive to improve the debt to equity ratio. The Company's overall strategy remains unchanged from last year.

The Company's management follows the policy of providing a firm capital base which allows supporting the trust of shareholders, creditors and market and ensuring future business development.
