DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER, 2024

The directors present their annual report on the affairs of Galaxy Backbone Limited ("the Company"), together with the financial statements for the year ended 31 December, 2024.

Legal Form

The Company was incorporated by the Federal Government of Nigeria as a limited liability company on 15 June 2006 with the name Galaxy Backbone Plc and commenced business effectively in 2007. On 8 February 2013, the name of the company was formally changed to Galaxy Backbone Limited.

Principal Activities and Business Performance

The Company is wholly-owned by the Federal Government and Jigawa State Government. It was established principally to build and operate network infrastructure platform and provide shared Information and Communication Technology (ICT) services to Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) of the Federal Government.

The Company's revenue reduced by 11% from N10.555 billion in 2023 to N9.410 billion in 2024. Cost of sales reduced by 30% while operating expenses increased by 44% over the prior year figures.

Property, Plant and Equipment

In the opinion of the directors, the value of the company's property, plant and equipment is not less than the value shown in the financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

1. Reporting entity

The Company was incorporated by the Federal Government of Nigeria as a limited liability company on 15 June 2006 with the name Galaxy Backbone Plc and commenced business effectively in 2007. On 8 February 2013, the name of the company was formally changed to Galaxy Backbone Limited. The address of the Company's registered office is 61, Adetokunbo Ademola Crescent, Wuse, FCT, Abuja. The Company's principal activity is to build and operate network infrastructure platform and provide shared Information and Communication Technology (ICT) services to Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) of the Federal Government.

2. Basis of preparation

a) Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRSs) as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB), and in compliance with Financial Reporting Council of Nigeria Act No. 6 2011. Additional information required by national regulation has been included where appropriate.

The financial statements comprise of the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, statement of financial position, statement of changes in equity, statement of cash flows and notes to the financial statements.

b) Going concern consideration

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, which assumes that the entity will be able to meet its financial obligations as at when they fall due. There are no significant financial obligations that will impact on the entity's resources which will affect the going concern of the entity. Management is satisfied that the entity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, the going concern basis has been adopted in preparing the financial statements.

c) Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for the financial instruments and valuation of plan assets in defined benefit pension schemes. These financial statements are presented in Naira (N) and all values are rounded to the nearest thousands except when otherwise indicated.

d) Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in Nigerian Naira (NGN), which is the Company's functional currency for presentation. All financial information presented in Naira has been rounded to the nearest unit, except where otherwise indicated.

e) Shareholders

The immediate controlling party, throughout, and as at 31 December 2024 and 2023 were Petroleum Technology Development Fund (PTDF) 55%, Ministry of Finance Incorporated (MoFI) 35% and Jigawa State Government 10%.

f) Use of judgments and estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on a going concern basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

In particular, information about assumptions and estimation uncertainties and critical judgments in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognized in the financial statements are described below:

i) Recognition of deferred tax assets

The recognition of deferred tax assets requires an assessment of future taxable profit. Deferred tax assets are only recognized to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which deductible temporary differences can be utilized. The availability of future taxable profits depend on several factors of the Company's future financial performance and if necessary implementation of tax planning strategies.

ii) Contingencies

By their nature, contingencies will only be resolved when one or more uncertain future events occur or fail to occur. The assessment of the existence, and potential quantum, of contingencies inherently involves the exercise of significant judgment and the use of estimates regarding the outcome of future events. (See Note 22).

iii) Impairment of financial assets

The Company recognises an allowance for Expected Credit Losses (ECLs) for all debt instruments not held at fair value through profit or loss. ECLs are based on the difference between the contractual cash flows due in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Company expects to receive, discounted at an approximation of the original effective interest rate. The expected cash flows will include cash flows from the sale of collateral held or other credit enhancements that are integral to the contractual terms.

ECLs are recognised in two stages. For credit exposures for which there has not been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, ECLs are provided for credit losses that result from default events that are possible within the next 12-months (a 12-month ECL). For those credit exposures for which there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, a loss allowance is required for credit losses expected over the remaining life of the exposure, irrespective of the timing of the default (a lifetime ECL).

For trade receivables and contract assets, the Company applies a simplified approach in calculating ECLs. Therefore, the Company does not track changes in credit risk, but instead recognises a loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date. The Company has established a provision matrix that is based on its historical credit loss experience, adjusted for forward-looking factors specific to the debtors and the economic environment.

The Company considers a financial asset in default when contractual payments are 60 days past due. However, in certain cases, the Company may also consider a financial asset to be in default when internal or external information indicates that the Company is unlikely to receive the outstanding contractual amounts in full before taking into account any credit enhancements held by the Company. A financial asset is written off when there is no reasonable expectation of recovering the contractual cash flows.

3. Adoption of new and revised standards

3.1 New and amended IFRS Standards that are effective for the current year

New and amended standards and interpretations that are effective for the current year

Several standards amendments and interpretations apply for the first time in 2024 but did not have an impact on the financial statements of the Company.

In the current year, the Company has applied a number of amendments to IFRS Accounting Standards issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) that are mandatorily effective for an accounting period that begins on or after 1 January 2024. Their adoption has not had any material impact on the disclosures or on the amounts reported in these financial statements.

3.1.1.Amendments to IAS 1 Presentation of Financial Statements—Classification of Liabilities as Current or Non-current

The amendments to IAS 1 published in January 2020 affect only the presentation of liabilities as current or noncurrent in the consolidated statement of financial position and not the amount or timing of recognition of any asset, liability, income or expenses, or the information disclosed about those items.

The amendments clarify that the classification of liabilities as current or non-current is based on rights that are in existence at the end of the reporting period, specify that classification is unaffected by expectations about whether an entity will exercise its right to defer settlement of a liability, explain that rights are in existence if covenants are complied with at the end of the reporting period, and introduce a definition of 'settlement' to make clear that settlement refers to the transfer to the counterparty of cash, equity instruments, other assets or services.

The directors of the Company have accessed the application of this amendment above and concluded that it did not have any material impact on the amounts recognised in the Company's consolidated financial statements for prior periods and in future periods.

3.1.2. Amendments to IAS 1 Presentation of Financial Statements—Non-current Liabilities with Covenants

The amendments specify that only covenants that an entity is required to comply with on or before the end of the reporting period affect the entity's right to defer settlement of a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting date (and therefore must be considered in assessing the classification of the liability as current or noncurrent). Such covenants affect whether the right exists at the end of the reporting period, even if compliance with the covenant is assessed only after the reporting date (e.g. a covenant based on the entity's financial position at the reporting date that is assessed for compliance only after the reporting date).

The IASB also specifies that the right to defer settlement of a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting date is not affected if an entity only has to comply with a covenant after the reporting period. However, if the entity's right to defer settlement of a liability is subject to the entity complying with covenants within twelve months after the reporting period, an entity discloses information that enables users of financial statements to understand the risk of the liabilities becoming repayable within twelve months after the reporting period. This would include information about the covenants (including the nature of the covenants and when the entity is required to comply with them), the carrying amount of related liabilities and facts and circumstances, if any, that indicate that the entity may have difficulties complying with the covenants.

The directors of the Company have accessed the application of this amendment above and concluded that it did not have any material impact on the amounts recognised in the Company's consolidated financial statements for prior periods and in future periods

3.1.3.Amendments to IAS 7 Statement of Cash Flows and IFRS 7 Financial Instruments: Disclosures—Supplier Finance Arrangements

The amendments add a disclosure objective to IAS 7 stating that an entity is required to disclose information about its supplier finance arrangements that enables users of financial statements to assess the effects of those arrangements on the entity's liabilities and cash flows. In addition, IFRS 7 was amended to add supplier finance arrangements as an example within the requirements to disclose information about an entity's exposure to concentration of liquidity risk.

The term 'supplier finance arrangements' is not defined. Instead, the amendments describe the characteristics of an arrangement for which an entity would be required to provide the information.

To meet the disclosure objective, an entity will be required to disclose in aggregate for its supplier finance arrangements:

- The terms and conditions of the arrangements;
- * The carrying amount, and associated line items presented in the entity's statement of financial position, of the liabilities that are part of the arrangements;
- * The carrying amount, and associated line items for which the suppliers have already received payment from the finance providers;
- * Ranges of payment due dates for both those financial liabilities that are part of a supplier finance arrangement and comparable trade payables that are not part of a supplier finance arrangement;
- * Liquidity risk information.

The directors of the Company have accessed the application of this amendment above and concluded that it did not have any material impact on the amounts recognised in the Company's consolidated financial statements for prior periods and in future periods

3.1.4.Amendment to IFRS 16 Leases—Lease Liability in a Sale and Leaseback

The amendments to IFRS 16 add subsequent measurement requirements for sale and leaseback transactions that satisfy the requirements in IFRS 15 to be accounted for as a sale. The amendments require the seller-lessee to determine 'lease payments' or 'revised lease payments' such that the seller-lessee does not recognise a gain or loss that relates to the right of use retained by the seller-lessee, after the commencement date.

The amendments do not affect the gain or loss recognised by the seller-lessee relating to the partial or full termination of a lease. Without these new requirements, a seller-lessee may have recognised a gain on the right of use it retains solely because of a remeasurement of the lease liability (for example, following a lease modification or change in the lease term) applying the general requirements in IFRS 16. This could have been particularly the case in a leaseback that includes variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or rate.

As part of the amendments, the IASB amended an Illustrative Example in IFRS 16 and added a new example to illustrate the subsequent measurement of a right-of-use asset and lease liability in a sale and leaseback transaction with variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or rate. The illustrative examples also clarify that the liability, that arises from a sale and leaseback transaction that qualifies as a sale applying IFRS 15, is a lease liability.

The directors of the Company have accessed the application of this amendment above and concluded that it did not have any material impact on the amounts recognised in the Company's consolidated financial statements for prior periods and in future periods

3.2. Interpretations Issued and Effective on or after 1 January 2025

The standards and interpretations that are issued, but not yet effective, up to the date of issuance of the Company's consolidated financial statements are disclosed below. The Company intends to adopt these standards, if applicable, when they become effective.

3.2.1. Standards issued and effective on or after 1 January 2025

- * Amendments to IAS 21 -- Lack of Exchangeability (effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2025);
- * Amendments to the Classification and Measurement of Financial Instruments Amendments to IFRS 9 and IFRS 7 (effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2026);
- * IFRS 19 Subsidiaries without Public Accountability: Disclosures (effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027);
- * IFRS 18 Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements (effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027);

The directors do not expect that the adoption of the Standards listed above will have a material impact on the consolidated financial statements of the Company in future periods, except if indicated below.

3.2.2. Amendments to IAS 21 -- Lack of Exchangeability (effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2025)

In August 2023, the IASB amended IAS 21 to help entities to determine whether a currency is exchangeable into another currency, and which spot exchange rate to use when it is not.

The directors do not expect that the adoption of the Standards listed above will have a material impact on the consolidated financial statements of the Company in future periods, except if indicated below.

3.2.3.Amendments to the Classification and Measurement of Financial Instruments – Amendments to IFRS 9 and IFRS 7 (effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2026)

On 30 May 2024, the IASB issued targeted amendments to IFRS 9 and IFRS 7 to respond to recent questions arising in practice, and to include new requirements not only for financial institutions but also for corporate entities. These amendments:

- * clarify the date of recognition and derecognition of some financial assets and liabilities, with a new exception for some financial liabilities settled through an electronic cash transfer system;
- * clarify and add further guidance for assessing whether a financial asset meets the solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) criterion;
- * add new disclosures for certain instruments with contractual terms that can change cash flows (such as some financial instruments with features linked to the achievement of environment, social and governance targets);
 and
- * update the disclosures for equity instruments designated at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI).

The directors do not expect that the adoption of the Standards listed above will have a material impact on the consolidated financial statements of the Company in future periods, except if indicated below.

3.2.4.IFRS 19 Subsidiaries without Public Accountability: Disclosures (effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027)

Issued in May 2024, IFRS 19 allows for certain eligible subsidiaries of parent entities that report under IFRS Accounting Standards to apply reduced disclosure requirements.

The directors do not expect that the adoption of the Standards listed above will have a material impact on the consolidated financial statements of the Company in future periods, except if indicated below.

3.2.5.IFRS 18 Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements (effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027)

IFRS 18 will replace IAS 1 Presentation of financial statements, introducing new requirements that will help to achieve comparability of the financial performance of similar entities and provide more relevant information and transparency to users. Even though IFRS 18 will not impact the recognition or measurement of items in the financial statements, its impacts on presentation and disclosure are expected to be pervasive, in particular those related to the statement of financial performance and providing management-defined performance measures. within the financial statements.

The new standard introduces the following key new requirements:

- * Entities are required to classify all income and expenses into five categories in the statement of profit or loss. Namely the operating, investing, financing, discontinued operations and income tax categories. Entities are also required to present a newly-defined operating profit subtotal. Entities net profit will not chnage.
- * Management-defined performance measures (MPMs) are disclosed in a single note in the financial statements.
- * Enhances guidance is provided on how to Company information in the financial statements.

In addition, all entities are required to use the operating profit sub-total as the starting points for the statement of cash flows when presenting operating cash flows under the indirect method.

Management is currently assessing the detailed implications of applying the new standard on the Company's consolidated financial statements. From the high-level preliminary assessment performed, the following potential impacts have been identified:

- * Although the adoption of IFRS 18 will have no impact on the Company's net profit, the Company mexpects that Companying items of income and expenses in the statement of profit or loss into the new categories will impact how operating profit is calculated and reported. From the high-level impact assessment that the Company has performed, the following items might potentially impact operating profit:
- * Foreign exchange differences currently aggregated in the line item 'other income and other gains/(losses) net' in operating profit might need to be disaggregated, with some foreign exchange gains or losses presented below operating profit.
- * IFRS 18 has specific requirements on the category in which derivative gains or losses are recognised which is the same category as the income and expenses affected by the risk that the derivative is used to manage. Although the Company currently recognises some gains or losses in operating profit and others in finance costs, there might be a change to where these gains or losses are recognised, and the Company is currently evaluating the need for change.
- * The line items presented on the primary financial statements might change as a result of the application of the concept of 'useful structured summary' and the enhanced principles on aggregation and disaggregation. In addition, since goodwill will be required to be separately presented in the statement of financial position, the Company will disaggregate goodwill and other intangible assets and present them separately in the statement of financial position.
- * The directors of the Company does not expect there to be a significant change in the information that is currently disclosed in the notes because the requirement to disclose material information remains unchanged; however, the way in which the information is Companyed might change as a result of the aggregation/disaggregation principles. In addition, there will be significant new disclosures required for:
- * management-defined performance measures;

- * a break-down of the nature of expenses for line items presented by function in the operating category of the statement of profit or loss this break-down is only required for certain nature expenses; and
- * for the first annual period of application of IFRS 18, a reconciliation for each line item in the statement of profit or loss between the restated amounts presented by applying IFRS 18 and the amounts previously presented applying IAS 1.
- * From a cash flow statement perspective, there will be changes to how interest received and interest paid are presented. Interest paid will be presented as financing cash flows and interest received as investing cash flows, which is a change from current presentation as part of operating cash flows.

The Company will apply the new standard from its mandatory effective date of 1 January 2027. Retrospective application is required, and so the comparative information for the financial year ending 31 December 2026 will be restated in accordance with IFRS 18.

4. Significant accounting policies

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all the years presented in these financial statements.

a) Revenue

Revenue is recognized to the extent it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, excluding discounts, sales taxes, excise duties and similar levies. The Company assesses its revenue arrangements against specific criteria in order to determine if it is acting as principal or agent. The Company is acting as a principal in all of its revenue arrangements.

Revenue from contract with customers

The Company applies the 5 step model in recognising revenue from contract with customers, which involves:

- i Identifying the contract with a customers
- ii Identifying the performance obligation in the contract
- iii Determining the transaction price
- iv Allocating the transaction price to the performance obligation in the contract
- v Recognising revenue when a performance obligation is satisfied by transferring a promised good or service to a customer (which is when the customer obtains control of that good or service).

Revenue from a valid contract with a customer is recognised when the following conditions are met:

- i The contract has been approved by the parties to the contract.
- ii The rights and obligations of the parties to the contract in relation to the goods and services to be transferred are identifiable.
- iii The payment terms for the goods and services to be transferred are identifiable.
- iv The contract has commercial substance.

It is probable that the consideration to which the Company is entitled to in exchange for the goods or services will be collected.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable for goods or services invoiced to third parties, net of VAT, discounts and returns. The company derives revenue from data carrier services (Internet), hosted services, hardware and software revenues and other allied revenues. Generally, revenue is recognized at the fair value of consideration received or receivable when significant risks and rewards of ownership have been transferred, which is when title passes to the customer depending on the nature of service rendered and any other specific contractual terms.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

Revenue recognition principles

Revenue recognition for invoiced services depends on the nature of service rendered and the type of contract. The company has two main contract types namely Mandate and Non-mandate services. The primary customers are Federal Government Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) who are covered by the Mandate services. These services are usually provided for in the Service Wide Vote of the annual Budget of the Federal Government. These MDAs can also enter into direct contracts with the company for additional services to complement the mandate services. In addition to the non-mandate contracts with MDAs, the company also has corporate and state governments as customers for the services.

Connectivity services, Business mails and Hosted services

These are mainly Mandate services budgeted for by Federal Government for services to its Ministries, Departments and Agencies for which quarterly payments are received in line with budget releases.

Receipts in respect of the Mandate services are accounted for as payments received in advance until revenue is recognized and the amount applied to settle the related invoice. Payments received in advance are included in Non-current liabilities.

Projects

Revenue is recognized when significant risks and rewards have passed to the buyer. Costs incurred in respect of projects are accounted for as Work-in-Progress (WIP) Technical and transferred to cost of sales when revenue is recognized.

Receipts in respect of invoices for non-mandate contracts are applied to settle the related invoice.

Hardware and software, Value-added services and Training services

Revenue is recognized in full at the time of invoicing for hardware and software while revenue is recognized for value-added and training services when they are delivered. If at the reporting date, the service has not been concluded, revenue is recognized based on the stage of completion at the reporting date.

b) Finance income and finance costs

Finance income comprises interest income on funds invested. Finance income is recognized as it accrues in profit or loss, using effective interest method.

Finance costs comprise interest expense on borrowings, bank charges and unwinding of the discount on provisions. Borrowing costs that are not directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of a qualifying asset are recognized in profit or loss using the effective interest method.

Foreign currency gains and losses are reported on a net basis as either finance income or finance cost depending on whether foreign currency movements are in a net gain or net loss position.

Borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets are capitalized as part of the cost of that asset. The capitalization of borrowing costs commences from the date of incurring of expenditure relating to the qualifying asset and ceases when all the activities necessary to prepare the qualifying asset for its intended use or sale are complete. The interest rate used to determine the amount of capitalized interest cost is the actual interest rate when there is a specific borrowing facility related to the qualifying asset or the Company's average borrowing interest rate. Borrowing costs relating to the period after acquisition, construction or production are expensed. Investment income earned on the temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets is deducted from the borrowing costs eligible for capitalization. The borrowing costs capitalized may not exceed the actual interest incurred by the Company.

c) Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated to Naira at the exchange rate prevailing on the date of the transactions. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the reporting date are translated to the functional currency at the exchange rate at that date. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated to the functional currency at the exchange rate at the date that the fair value was determined. Foreign currency differences are generally recognized in profit or loss. Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at historical exchange rates if measured based on historical cost.

Foreign currency differences arising on retranslation are recognized in profit or loss. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rate at the date of the translation.

i) Recognition and measurement

Property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses.

Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. Property, plant and equipment under construction are disclosed as capital work-in-progress. The cost of self constructed assets include the cost of materials and direct labor, any other costs directly attributable to bringing the assets to a working condition for their intended use, borrowing costs on qualifying assets in accordance with the Company's accounting policy and the costs of dismantling and removing the items and restoring the site on which they are located if the Company has a legal or constructive obligation.

Purchased software that is integral to the functionality of the related equipment is capitalized as part of the equipment.

When parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives and are individually significant in relation to total cost of an item, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognized upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the asset. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment are determined by comparing the sales proceeds with the carrying amount of the property, plant and equipment and are recognized net in profit or loss.

ii) Subsequent costs

The cost of replacing a component of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognized in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the component will flow to the Company and its cost can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of the replaced component is derecognized. The cost of day-to-day servicing of property, plant and equipment are recognized in profit or loss as incurred.

iii) Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated over the depreciable amount, which is the cost of an asset, less its residual value. Depreciation is recognized in profit or loss depending on the utilization of the respective assets on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of each part of an item of property, plant and equipment which reflects the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits embodied in the asset.

Leased assets held under finance lease are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and their useful lives unless it is reasonably certain that the Company will obtain ownership by the end of the lease term in which case the assets are depreciated over their useful life on the same basis as owned assets.

Depreciation rates, methods and the residual values underlying the calculation of depreciation of items of property, plant and equipment are kept under review on an annual basis to take account of any change in circumstances.

When deciding on depreciation rates and methods, the principal factors the Company takes into account are the expected rate of technological developments and expected market requirements for, and the expected pattern of usage of the assets.

e) Intangible assets

These consist of licenses procured from Nigerian Communications (NCC) and software from other providers and Licensors, Intangible assets excluding goodwill is stated at cost, less accumulated amortization and impairement losses, if any. Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount of the intangible asset or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The cost of the software is capitalized and thereafter written off over three years irrespective of procurement time within the year, while the license fees is also capitalized and amortized over the license period.

f) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lowers of cost and net realizable value. The cost of inventories is based on the first-in-first-out principle and includes expenses incurred in acquiring the inventories; production and conversion costs and other costs incurred in bring them to their existing locations and condition. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs of completion and selling expenses.

g) Financial instruments

i) Non-derivative financial assets

The Company initially recognizes loans and receivables on the date that they are originated. All other financial assets (including assets designated at fair value through profit or loss, if any) are recognized initially on the trade date at which the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

The Company derecognizes a financial asset when the contractual rights to cash flows from the asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows on the financial asset in a transaction in which substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred. Any interest in transferred financial assets that is created or retained by the Company is recognized as a separate asset or liability.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Company has a legal right to offset the amounts and intends either to settle them on a net basis or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

The Company has the following non-derivative financial assets: loans and receivables.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Such assets are recognized initially at fair value plus any directly attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, loans and receivables are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses.

Short term receivables that do not attract interest are measured at original invoice amount where the effect of discounting is not material.

Staff receivables

It is the company's policy to grant its staff interest-free loans. The fair value of staff receivable is estimated as the present value of future cash flows, discounted at the market rate of interest at the measurement date. Fair value for short term receivables with no stated interest rate are measured at the original invoice amount if the effect of discounting is immaterial. Fair value is determined at initial recognition and for disclosure purpose, at each annual reporting date.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand; cash balances with banks and call deposits with original maturities of three months or less. Bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the Company's cash management are included as a component of cash and cash equivalents for the purpose of statement of cash flows.

ii) Non-derivative financial liabilities

All financial liabilities (including liabilities designated at fair value through profit or loss, if any) are recognized initially on the trade date at which the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

The Company derecognizes a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged, cancelled or expired.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Company has a legal right to offset the amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

The Company has the following non-derivative financial liabilities: loans and borrowings, trade and other payables.

Such financial liabilities are recognized initially at fair value plus any directly attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, these financial liabilities are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

Short term payables that do not attract interest are measured at original invoice amount where the effect of discounting is not material.

iii) Share capital

The Company has only one class of shares, namely ordinary shares. Ordinary shares are classified as equity. When new shares are issued, they are recorded in share capital at their par value. The excess of the issue price over the par value is recorded in the share premium reserve. The authorized, issued and fully paid share capital of the company was 1,000,000,000 as at 31 December, 2024.

Incremental costs directly attributable to the issue of ordinary shares are recognized as a deduction from equity, net of any tax effects.

h) Impairment

i) Non-derivative financial assets

A financial asset not carried at fair value through profit or loss is assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is objective evidence that it is impaired. A financial asset is impaired if objective evidence indicates that a loss event has occurred after the initial recognition of the asset, and that the loss event had a negative effect on the estimated future cash flows of that asset that can be reliably estimated.

Objective evidence that financial assets are impaired can include default or delinquency by a debtor, restructuring of an amount due to the Company on terms that the Company would not consider otherwise, indications that a debtor or issuer will enter bankruptcy, or the disappearance of an active market for a security. In addition, for an investment in an equity security, a significant or prolonged decline in its fair value below its cost is objective evidence of impairment.

The Company considers evidence of impairment for receivables at both a specific asset and collective level. All individually significant receivables are assessed for specific impairment. All individually significant receivables found not to be specifically impaired are then collectively assessed for any impairment that has been incurred but not yet identified. Receivables that are not individually significant are collectively assessed for impairment by Companying together receivables with similar risk characteristics.

In assessing collective impairment the Company uses historical trends of the probability of default, timing of recoveries and the amount of loss incurred, adjusted for management's judgment as to whether current economic and credit conditions are such that the actual losses are likely to be greater or less than suggested by historical trends.

An impairment loss in respect of a financial asset measured at amortized cost is calculated as the difference between its carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. Losses are recognized in profit or loss and reflected in an allowance account against receivables. Interest on the impaired asset where applicable continues to be recognized through the unwinding of the discount. When a subsequent event causes the amount of impairment loss to decrease, the decrease in impairment loss is reversed through profit or loss.

ii) Non-financial assets

The carrying amounts of the Company's non-financial assets, other than inventories and deferred tax assets are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, then the asset's recoverable amount is estimated.

The Company's corporate assets do not generate separate cash inflows. If there is an indication that a corporate asset may be impaired, then the recoverable amount is determined for the CGU to which the corporate asset belongs.

An impairment loss is recognized if the carrying amount of an asset or its CGU exceeds its estimated recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognized in profit or loss. Impairment losses recognized in respect of CGUs are allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill allocated to the units, and then to reduce the carrying amounts of the other assets in the unit (Company of units) on a pro rata basis.

Impairment losses recognized in prior periods are assessed at each reporting date for any indications that the loss has decreased or no longer exists. An impairment loss is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount. An impairment loss is reversed only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation or amortization, if no impairment loss had been recognized.

Income tax expense comprises current tax and deferred tax. Current tax and deferred tax are recognized in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to items recognized directly in equity or in other comprehensive income.

i) Current tax

Current tax is the expected tax payable or receivable on the taxable income or loss for the year and any adjustment to tax payable or receivable in respect of previous years. Using tax rates statutorily enacted at the reporting date.

Current income tax relating to items recognized directly in equity is recognized in equity and not in profit or loss.

The Company is subject to the following types of current income taxes:

Company Income Taxes

This relates to tax on income and profit generated by the Company during the year that is taxed under the Companies Income Tax Act as amended to date.

Tertiary Education Tax

Tertiary education tax is tax based on the assessable profit of the Company and is governed by the Tertiary Education Trust Fund (Establishment) Act.

ii) Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognized in respect of temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognized for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognized for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilized. Such deferred tax assets and liabilities are not recognized if the temporary difference arises from the initial recognition of other assets and liabilities in a transaction that affects neither the taxable profit nor the accounting profit.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax is measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period in which the liability is settled or the asset realized, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period. The measurement of deferred tax liabilities and assets reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Company expects, at the end of the reporting period, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset if there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax liabilities and assets, and they relate to income taxes levied by the same tax authority on the same taxable entity, or on different tax entities, but they intend to settle current tax liabilities and assets on a net basis or their tax assets and liabilities will be realized simultaneously.

j) Employee benefits

The Company do not have any defined benefit schemes or other post (and other long term) employment liabilities requiring provision.

K) Pension fund scheme

In accordance with the provisions of the revised Pension Reform Act, 2014 the Company has instituted a Contributory Pension Scheme for its employees, where both the employees and the Company contribute 8% and 10% of the employee emoluments (basic salary, housing and transport allowances). The Company's contribution under the scheme is charged to the income statement while employee contributions are funded through payroll deductions.

L) Provisions and contingent liabilities

Provisions

A provision is recognized if, as a result of a past event, the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation that can be estimated reliably, and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation. Provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows at a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognized as finance cost.

A provision for restructuring is recognized when the Company has approved a detailed and formal restructuring plan, and the restructuring either has commenced or has been announced publicly. Future operating losses are not provided for.

A provision for onerous contracts is recognized when the expected benefits to be derived by the Company from a contract are lower than the unavoidable cost of meeting its obligations under the contract. The provision is measured at the present value of the lower of the expected cost of terminating the contract and the expected net cost of continuing with the contract. Before a provision is established, the Company recognizes any impairment loss on the assets associated with that contract.

Contingent liabilities

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company, or a present obligation that arises from past events but is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation; or the amount of the obligation cannot be measured with sufficient reliability.

Contingent liabilities are only disclosed and not recognized as liabilities in the statement of financial position. If the likelihood of an outflow of resources is remote, the possible obligation is neither a provision nor a contingent liability and no disclosure is made.

I) IFRS 16 - Leases

Right-of-use assets

The new standard supersedes IAS 17 and will result in almost all leases being recognised on the statement of financial position by lessees as the distinction between operating and finance leases is removed. Under the new standard, an asset (the right of use asset) and a financial liability to pay rentals are recognised; the only exceptions are short-term leases that do not contain a purchase option and low-level leases. The right-of-use assets will be depreciated on a straight-line basis. The liability, recognised as part of borrowings, will be measured at a discounted value using the interest rate implicit in the lease (if that rate can be determined) or the incremental borrowing rate of the lease and any interest will be charged to finance costs in the income statement. Therefore, the charge to the income for the operating lease expense will be replaced with depreciation on the right-of-use asset and the interest charge inherent in the lease.

Lease payments

Variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate are included in the initial measurement of the lease liability and are initially measured using the index or rate as at the commencement date.

Amounts expected to be payable by the lesse under residual value guarantees are also included.

Variable lease payments that are not included in the measurement of the lease liability are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which the event or condition that triggers payment occurs, unless the costs are included in the carrying amount another asset under another standard.

The lease provides the lease option to buy the assets at the end of the lease term.

m) Earnings per share

The Company presents basic earnings per share (EPS) data for its ordinary shares. Basic EPS is calculated by dividing the profit or loss attributable to ordinary shareholders of the Company by the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding during the year.

5. Determination of fair values

A number of the Company's accounting policies and disclosures require the determination of fair value, both for financial and non-financial assets and liabilities. Fair values have been determined for measurement and/or disclosure purposes based on the following methods. When applicable, further information about the assumptions made in determining fair values is disclosed in the notes specific to that asset or liability.

a) Trade and other receivables

The fair value of trade and other receivables is estimated as the present value of the future cash flows, discounted at the market rate of interest at the reporting date. This fair value is determined for disclosure purposes. For short-term receivables, no disclosure of fair value is presented when the carrying amount is a reasonable approximation of fair value.

b) Non-derivative financial instruments

Fair value, which is determined for disclosure purposes, is calculated based on the present value of future principal and interest cash flows, discounted at the market rate of interest at the reporting date. For non-derivative financial liabilities repayable on demand, the fair value is not less than the face value.

21 Financial risk management and financial instruments

The Company has exposure to the following risks from its use of financial instruments:

- · Credit risk
- · Liquidity risk
- Market risk

Risk management framework

The Company's directors have overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the Company's risk management framework.

The Company's risk management policies identify and analyze risks faced by the Company, to set appropriate risk limits and controls, and to monitor risks and adherence to limits. Risk management policies and systems will be reviewed regularly to reflect changes in market conditions and the Company's activities.

The Company's Board of Directors will oversee and monitor compliance with the Company's risk management policies and procedures, and will review the adequacy of the risk management framework in relation to the risks faced by the Company.

a) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if a customer or party to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations, and arises principally from the Company's receivables from customers and other related parties.

The carrying amount of financial assets represents the maximum credit exposure.

Trade and other receivables

Management has credit policies in place and the exposure to credit risk is monitored on an ongoing basis. Under the credit policies all customers requiring credit over a certain amount are reviewed and new customers analyzed individually for credit worthiness before the Company's standard payment and delivery terms and conditions are offered. The Company's credit assessment process includes specified cash deposits by new customers. Credit limits are established for qualifying customers and these limits are reviewed regularly by the Board. Customers that fail to meet the Company's benchmark credit worthiness may transact with the Company only on a prepayment basis.

The Board of Directors reviews each customers' credit limit in line with the customers performance in the preceding quarter and perceived risk factor assigned to the customer.

Majority of the Company's customers have been transacting with the Company for over two years, and losses have occurred infrequently. In monitoring customer credit risk, customers are grouped according to their credit characteristics, including whether they are an individual or legal entity, whether they are a small and medium scale, listed or high profiled customer, industry, aging profile, and existence of previous financial difficulties. Trade and other receivables relate mainly to the Company's high profiled customers. Customers with no trading activities for a period of up to one year are placed on a dormant customer list, and future sales are made on a prepayment basis only with approval of the Board.

The Company establishes an allowance for impairment that represents its estimate of incurred losses in respect of trade and other receivables. The main components of this allowance are a specific loss component that relates to individually significant exposures, and a collective loss component established for groups of similar assets in respect of losses that have been incurred but not yet identified. The collective loss allowance is determined based on historical data of payment statistics for similar financial assets.

The Company held cash and bank balances of N494 million as at 31 December 2024 (2023: N186 million), which represents its maximum credit exposure on these assets.

b) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will encounter difficulty in meeting the obligations associated with its financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset. The Company's approach to managing liquidity is to ensure, as far as possible, that it will always have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when due, under both normal and stressed conditions, without incurring unacceptable losses or risking damage to the Company's reputation. The Company's general rule is to ensure that cash flow on its contracts is positive or less neutral.

Typically, the Company's credit terms with customers are more favourable compared to payment terms to its vendors in order to help provide sufficient cash on demand to meet expected operational expenses, including the servicing of financial obligations. This excludes the potential impact of extreme circumstances that cannot reasonably be predicted, such as natural disasters.

It is not expected that the cash flows included in the maturity analysis could occur significantly earlier, or at significantly different amounts. The Company has not provided any guarantees as at year-end.

c) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that changes in market prices, such as foreign exchange rates, interest rates and equity prices will affect the Company's income or the value of its holdings of financial instruments. The objective of market risk management is to manage and control market risk exposures within acceptable parameters, whilst optimizing the return.

The Company manages market risks by keeping costs low through various cost optimization programmes. Moreover, market developments are monitored and discussed regularly and mitigating actions are taken where necessary.

d) Currency risk

The Company is exposed to currency risk on revenue and purchases that are denominated in a currency other than its functional currency, the Naira. The currency in which the transactions are primarily denominated is the US Dollar (USD). The currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to the changes in foreign exchange rates.

In managing currency risk, the Company aims to reduce the impact of short-term fluctuations on earnings. The Company has no export sales. Thus the exposure to currency risk in that regard is non existence. The Company's significant exposure to currency risk relates to its importation of various materials and other property, plant and equipment. Although the Company has various measures to mitigate exposure to foreign exchange rate movement, over the longer term, however, permanent changes in exchange rates would have an impact on profit. The Company monitors the movement in the currency rates on an ongoing basis.

e) Sensitivity analysis

A weakening of the Naira, as indicated above, against the USD, EURO and GBP at 31 December would have increased/decreased profit or loss by the amounts shown below. This analysis is based on foreign currency exchange rate variances that the Company considered to be reasonably possible at the end of the reporting period. The analysis assumes that all other variables, in particular interest rates, remain constant. The analysis is performed on the same basis for 2023, albeit that the reasonably possible foreign exchange rate variances were different.

A weakening of the Naira against the above currencies at 31 December would have had the equal but opposite effect on the above currencies to the amounts shown above, on the basis that all other variables remain constant.
